Thanks to Candace and Gina and their committee members who made the Conference such a success. It was the perfect combination of socializing and education carried out with grace and professionalism.

I was able to tear our members away from the gaming tables for very productive board and business meetings. At the board meeting we discussed a number of issues including the recent changes to the bylaws which in effect changed our fiscal year and necessitated further "housekeeping" changes to the bylaws. With the issue of the Title Change behind us (or perhaps still pending for some!), I hope that we will be able to move forward. The issues I want to focus on are:

TRAINING - the JSAG is working on this and will keep us posted and our Conference Chairs have made training and education the central theme of the Conferences including numerous enrichment programs in the agendas. BENEFITS INITIATIVES - by now we have all received the new benefits initiatives offered by the Administrative Office; the JSAG focus group on which I serve will continue to work on further developments.

MEMBERSHIP - I have discussed with some of the board members the possibility of appointing district representatives within the Circuits to help the Circuit Reps with recruiting efforts, and I hope that our new "Legislative/Communications" Committee can help with this initiative.

JOB SECURITY/PLACEMENT - I hope to develop a plan to assist "displaced" secretaries/assistants in finding other employment within the Judiciary, possibly through the use of our website.

I know that with the help of my talented and energetic board and committees we will make great strides in all of these areas. I would like to thank all the Board Members and Committee Chairs who have helped me so much already and, I know, will continue to work endlessly on our behalf. Cecilia Rudden, our immediate Past

The Judges' Secretaries Advisory Group met in Washington, D.C. on September 8 and 9, 1999. The minutes are on the J-Net. There was a briefing on the Judicial Council's March 1999 decision to allow the individual Judges to determine the official title that they wish to call their secretaries. We had over 100 Judges who responded and supported this decision. Thanks to everyone in our circuit who were involved and instrumental in bringing this about. We are all very appreciative.

You all should have received and signed up by now, if you so chose, packages on Long Term Health Care and the Flexible Spending Accounts. The AO has negotiated three open enrollments for these benefits and the next two will be determined at a later date.

We also now have access to the Virtual Law Library through the J-Net. If you have a moment, and you have not already done so, do some exploring in it. You have access to both West Law and Lexis.

The Judicial Conference approved conducting a study on the

training needs of the entire judiciary and the AO entered into a contract with a private company. The Logistics Management Institute was selected to assist in the development of the study and to examine the training needs of the judiciary.

Another group designed to study Personnel Issues consisting of Cindy Grossman, Trish Kowalski, Barbara Smith, Marcia Carter, and Flay Sambrone-Metoyer will be developing an orientation pamphlet for new secretaries to give them an overview of chamber's operations and to serve as a resource tool. The group is also looking at working on benefits initiatives to insure that they are tailored toward chambers staff. The group voiced that they want to work on protection for current employees, job continuation and/or placement if a judge retires or leaves the bench, and the establishment of a court secretarial pool or floater system as a possible placement for a secretary whose position is discontinued. This is a very important group that we should support in any way possible.

New course offering: WordPerfect 8/9 Macro Basics on the FJTN by Karen Scales

Many of you have heard about the various automated document production programs being used in the courts. The District of Arizona and the Middle District of Florida have been particularly active in creating WordPerfect macros to automate repetitive tasks specific to the work done in chambers. In an effort to meet the growing need for understanding macros, how to customize some of the more sophisticated ones and making you a more valuable asset to your judge, TTSD may soon be offering two new training opportunities for you.

** We are still formulating the courses described below and the details and dates are subject to change. **

The WordPerfect Macro Basics class focuses on the concepts and skills you will need to create and edit simple macros. Topics include creating a macro, editing a macro, using the Macro Tools toolbar, inserting comments and formatting and adding some programming elements. Also included is an overview of the built-in macros provided with WordPerfect and macro file management. This class will provide the groundwork necessary to advance your macro programming skills.

The class will be approximately 4 hours in length and taught over the U.S. Courts Federal Judicial Television Network (FJTN) satellite broadcast network in two 2-hour segments. TENTATIVE dates are February 28 - 29 and May 1 - 2, 2000. (We are still awaiting confirmation on these dates and therefore are subject to change.) You must be registered to participate in this course and registration will be limited. The Macro Basics course is a prerequisite for attendance at the resident-based Macro Programming course to be offered in San Antonio, Texas next summer. Please watch the FJTN Bulletin and TTSD's intra-net web site (156.132.84.151) for more details. (Please note: You need to remove everything from the "Location" field and enter ONLY the numbers in order to access TTSD through the *intra*- net not the *inter*-net.)

The target audience is court personnel using WP8 or WP9. This group includes judges, secretaries, courtroom deputies and other chambers staff. The target participant of this course is an intermediate WordPerfect user. It is designed for someone who is already familiar with WordPerfect basics. Completion of the following WordPerfect courses broadcast on the FJTN (or equivalent skills) are prerequisite: WordPerfect (WP) Basics, WP File Management, WP Formatting, WP Quick Family and WP Templates.

It appears that we will be headed to Salt Lake City, Utah in 2002. Lael Noble and Phyllis Walker made a great sell for the West. Inasmuch as 2003 may be the year of our next Joint Tri-Association Conference, we will have to wait and see what other suggestions may be offered by the ABJA. One consideration that was raised during the business session was the idea of



JSAG is an AO advisory group for the benefit of secretaries/judicial assistants. Cindy Grossman shared her minutes from the last meeting in Washington, DC. She told us Karen Redman was the AO contact person if our judge is having trouble with the media. You can get direct e-mail notice of the JSAG meetings by signing up on the J-Net in "What's Also on the J-Net is the New." "Judges Corner" where law clerk information may be posted. Cindy encouraged us to apply for JSAG membership as the terms expire December 2000.

A very nice buffet was provided for lunch. During lunch, Michael Berney of the FJC passed out brochures he thought would be of interest regarding programs available through the FJC. Michael also played a few songs on the piano before we returned to the meeting room. In the afternoon, Michael led us in a session entitled "Making Decisions in a Crisis." This exercise allowed us to focus on making a decision in a crisis -- a what if? -- situation. After reading the problem, we individually answered questions. Next, as a group, we discussed and answered the questions Finally, we reviewed the again. It was very correct answers. interesting to hear how each of us analyzed the situation just a little differently, and how the group collaborated to make the right decisions. Brainstorming is always fun.

On Friday, Carolyn Weber started the morning with a demonstration of her "WeberPerfect" method for getting out those day-to-day orders. Her system is a "do it only once" program that's actually a merge function. If a name, case number, and all attendant information has been entered once, it's never necessary to enter that again.

You merely check the relevant boxes and print, and the order comes out in final form with only the information you checked. Fascinating!

Next, John Leonard and Karen Scales of the San Antonio Training Center talked about the training that is available from the Center via satellite. John walked us through electronic case filing (ECF) and encouraged us to take advantage of all Web-based training (CBT). He showed us a particular online learning program; i.e., how to screw in a light bulb at http://www.sageinteractive.com/tutor ial.html. The Center is always available to answer particular questions or to make other suggestions.

That afternoon we all went on a two-hour bus tour of historic Boston which included the Freedom Trail and other interesting sites in downtown Boston. The bus dropped us off at the new U.S. courthouse for a tour and brief overview presentation, both historically and architecturally. Afterwards, we explored the waterfront area and dined at one of the many restaurants at Faneuil Hall. It was late when we got back to the hotel.

On Saturday, we heard from Dick Simmons, Chief of the Retirement Division of the AO. Mr. Simmons urged us to start planning for retirement, especially if we are within five years of taking the big step. He warned us to never cancel our health insurance once we are retired, because once canceled, we can never get back into the government insurance program. Dick also suggested that we take the low option health insurance at age 65, and pointed out that the cost for health and life insurance will not change after retirement. Only CSRS retirement applies credit for accrued sick leave. Dick gave us lots of information to think about.

After a buffet luncheon, FJSA and

FMJSA held their joint business meeting which began at 1:20 PM. Shirley Newsome, President of FJSA, and Nancy Smith, President of FMJSA, presided. Officers and Circuit Representatives were introduced as well as first-time attendees and retirees.

A presentation was made by Lael Noble and Phyllis Walker on Salt Lake City as the site for Conference 2002. The hotel will be downtown and the room rate will match per diem. The date will be October 10-14, 2002.

Bert Rixner of the Ways & Means Committee stated as a fund raiser FJSA is going to prepare a cookbook of "recipes you got from your grandmother." E-mail your recipes to: bert_rixner@txs.uscourts.gov. Ann Sherman reported that FMJSA is again going to sell raffle tickets. This has been FMJSA's best fund raiser.

Ferle Terry of FMJSA reported on the planning of Chicago Conference 2001. It will be held at the Chicago Regal Knickerbocker Hotel and the room rate will be \$175 double occupancy. There will be optional group activities: 3-hour City of Chicago tour; progressive dinner; shopping activities at the Apparel Center. She passed out a "Ten Best Reasons for Coming to Chicago" brochure and gum courtesy of Wrigley.

Merger of all three associations was discussed. The mission of both FJSA and FMJSA is to work in the direction of merger. ABJA will be encouraged to join with us, especially in conferencing. FMJSA President Nancy Smith expressed her thanks to the FJSA Board and to Cecilia Rudden (FJSA) and Ann Sherman (FMJSA) on their successful coordination of this Conference.

Shirley introduced the JSAG members who were present: Cindy

Grossman, Trish Kowalski, and Cecilia Cindy talked about the Rudden. resources available to new judges. Cindy had copies available for application to join JSAG for a term of two years. Some of the present terms are up the end of December. Townsend Robinson of the AO will be appointing half new members and reappointing others. The Circuit JSAG representative should send out minutes of these meetings. The official minutes will be on the J-NET in a few weeks in "What's New." The deadline is November 1 for applications to join Townsend makes JSAG. recommendations to AO Director Ralph Mecham who will then make the appointments.

At 2:20 PM, the members of FMJSA adjourned and the FJSA meeting continued. Outgoing FJSA President Trish Kowalski said it was with relief and sadness that she passed on the gavel to Shirley Newsome. Shirley thanked Trish for all her hard work during the past year.

Trish advised that former Circuit Representative Karen Spiedowski had passed away a few months ago. Shirley asked Trish about a memorial. A very emotional eulogy prepared by Karen's judge was read by Trish. A moment-of-silence was held in Karen's memory.

Shirley stated she had received comments from several members as a result of the By-Laws changes that had to do with retirees not having a vote in the business of this association. She read the appropriate section of the By-Laws to those present, and stated that the vote passed by 136 to 8 with 2 abstaining which was an overwhelming passage. Shirley requested discussion regarding revisiting the issue of voting for retirees. A motion that this issue be revisited was made by Helen Anderson and seconded by Cecilia Rudden.

Passage was unanimous. Shirley will ask the Membership Committee and ultimately the By-Laws Committee to revisit this issue of retirees' voting rights. Shirley will assign follow-up on this issue to VP Ann Nielsen as chair of the Membership Committee.

The status of the *Newsletter* was reviewed. Publications are issued three or four times a year. Electronic mail is a possibility for the future. Shirley would like to see the format changed. She will discuss this with Bonnie Nohs. The President's focus for this year is going to be membership. Shirley hopes to get email addresses for all secretaries and will send them copies of our *Newsletter*.

Kansas City or Houston will be the site of Conference 2003. This will be a joint conference with FMJSA.

Our Association has 348 members of a possible 900+. Our sister Associations likewise have memberships of only 1/3 of those eligible. ABJA will have 21 persons at their annual conference this year. FMJSA has joined with us for the last three years and has shared equally for this conference. FJSA and FMJSA are working well together.

Twenty-four different titles for judicial secretary are being used. Some are judicial assistant, judicial secretary, paralegal, administrative assistant, administrative executive. Because of the long and hard struggle with the Judicial Conference and AO to allow title change, those who wish their titles changed should have their judges write to the AO in order to make it official.

The grand finale of the Boston Conference was the banquet. During a delicious dinner, we were entertained by Billy McGhee's Jazz Quartet. Our guest speaker was the Honorable Nancy Gertner, United States District Judge for the District of In preparing her Massachusetts. remarks, Judge Gertner, who is a former law clerk, decided it would be more fun to reminisce about her clerkship. I think everyone in attendance thoroughly enjoyed listening to Judge Gertner and silently adapting her recollections to their own chambers. It was a delightful evening which ended with everyone saying their goodbyes.





HON. SEYBOURN HARRIS LYNNE 1907 - 2000

On September 10, 2000 the United States District Court for the Northern District of Alabama lost someone special, Judge Seybourn H. Lynne. Judge Lynne was appointed to the federal bench by President Harry S. Truman on January 9, 1946. He became Chief Judge in 1953 and took senior status in 1973. In August of 1992, he was recognized in the Congressional Record by Senator Howell Heflin as the most senior judge in the federal court system.

Judge Lynne was on the federal bench during the civil rights era. He was the dissenting member of a threejudge panel ruling racial segregation on Montgomery, Alabama, city buses was unconstitutional. Judge Lynne became widely known for his order which prohibited the late Governor of Alabama, George Wallace, from blocking black students from the University of Alabama. One precedent setting case decided by Judge Lynne, Petway v. American Cast Iron Pipe, prohibits maintaining segregated eating, bathing and recreational facilities by employers.

Even in his 90s, Judge Lynne made weekly trips to the courthouse in Birmingham. He will be missed!



JSAG REPORT
MEETING AT THE AO
WASHINGTON, DC
SEPT. 12-13, 2000

On September 12 and 13 the JSAG met in Washington, D.C. I wanted to give you a summary of what took place at that meeting. The official minutes will be available on the J-Net.

The meeting began with opening remarks by A.C. Ressler, Assistant Director, Office of Human Resources & Statistics. Mr. Ressler spoke about the National Training Needs Assessment and emphasized that this is an ongoing process and the fact that training is coming from many different medias but that live programs will continue.

Townsend Robinson, Chair of the JSAG, continued the meeting with an overall of the program. There was some discussion of our titles. Secretaries in this Circuit, along with their judges, have chosen some the following titles: Administrative Assistant, Executive Assistant, Judicial Administrative Assistant, Court Secretary (swing pool). Also, many have kept the title of Secretary.

H. Allen Brown, Human Resources Division, spoke to us regarding Judicial Resources Committee Issues. They believe the 2001 budget request will by fully funded and should be of little impact to individual courts. Included on the consent calendar is a revision to the leave policy to increase from 7 to 30 days for each calendar year the amount of paid leave for employees who serve as organ donors. They are expected to endorse physical fitness for court employees and the AO is working on policy which may include private club memberships, up to a certain dollar amount. Don't look for this until fall 2001 at the earliest. There was discussion that the law clerk pool is shrinking due to high salaries being offered by law firms. An informal survey showed that Magistrate and Bankruptcy Judges seem to be having the most problems. The Magistrate and Bankruptcy Judges do seem to have more career law clerks than Article III Judges: 17% - Circuit Judges; 25% - District Judges; and 60% for Magistrate and Bankruptcy Judges.

Karen E. Redmond. Office of Public Affairs, spoke regarding Press Relations. Each court should have a media policy and one individual to answer all requests from the press. We should keep our dealings with the press to a minimum and the court contact is someone you can refer them to. Ms. Redmond suggests that you do keep a list of name and telephone numbers of all press that you speak to in case of

any problems. Her office will provide you guidance with dealing with reporters. Please email her at the AO HUB with any questions or concerns you might have.

Clare F. DeCleen and Ahmed Abdurrezak, from the Administrative Services Office did a demonstration on Recent J-Net Developments. The J-Net continues to take on a new look. They are working throughout the AO to have a uniform look to the J-Net to make it more user friendly. The most recent addition to the J-Net is the "What's New" website, which can be found on the home page. You can go to it directly or subscribe to "What's New" and receive through you email postings from the AO of the ten latest entries. This is a great way of keeping informed all the latest coming out from the AO and sometimes you will find you receive memo's this way before they arrive in the mail. It was emphasized that more and more is being released over the J-Net including forms that need to be completed and sent back directly through the J-Net. If you and/or the Judge have not checked out the "Judges' Corner" take a look. It has been revised to make it easier to use and has a lot of information. They hope at some point to have a working group, but that is way down the road.

Robert Wily, Article III Judges Division, demonstrated the new Law Clerk Information Website. This is an information website for those applying for law clerk positions. It is being presented to the Judicial Conference on September 19 and is expected to go live October 2. This is a wonderful program that has different access for chambers and applicants. From chambers we can put information into the system about when, how, and what kind of applicant the judge might be looking for. This can be as informative as to sends when the judge

acknowledgments out that they have received applications to when her or she will be interviewing. Make sure you watch for this website after October 2. It will be found on the J-Net as a link in the "Judges Corner" on the side. It should really cut down on telephone calls to chambers from all the law students.

John R. Breslin, Accounting and Financial Systems Division, spoke on Travel Policies and Judges' Mr. Breslin did a Procedures. review of policies emphasizing that frequent flyer miles are government property when earned while on official business. If official and personal business miles are mixed and each cannot be documented all miles belong to the government. Ledgers for personal and official trip mileage earned should be maintained. Tax exemption information is now available on the J-Net on the program desk in the travel center.

Lee Horvath, Judiciary Benefits Initiative Staff, spoke regarding Judiciary Benefits Initiatives. Shortly there will be marketing on the flexible health benefit program. 25% of the judiciary took advantage of this This is an insurance program. program where you put X amount of pretax dollars to be used for medical related expenses that are not covered under health insurance. They hope to introduce a new benefit, pre-tax commuter reimbursement for judges and judiciary employees tentatively set for early 2001. Each court benefit coordinator should have more information on both of these programs.

Mary Stickney, Electronic Public Access Program, spoke with us regarding Case Management-Electronic Case Files. The court's are beginning to go live with electronic filing. They expect all

bankruptcy courts to be live within two years which will be followed by the district courts and then the court of appeals. It is a very flexible program and the AO is working very closely with each court as it is implemented. If you wold like further information on electronic filing programs they can be found on the FJTN.

Bruce Johnson and Cathy Budget Division spoke Stephens, regarding the New Funding for Chambers Staff Training. There was a discussion on how this fund is to be used and whether or not it can be used for private association meetings. There are exceptions for using this fund for private association meetings with strict guidelines that have to be certified by the Chief Judge.

Bruce Johnson of the Budget Division reported that the **Budget Outlook** for FY 2001 is good. The judiciary received a 6.6% increase in the House-passed bill and a 7.4% in the Senate. The salaries and expenses account that funds the appellate, district and bankruptcy courts and probation and pretrial services increased 6.5%. A 7.5% increase is needed to maintain current services.

Maurice White and Carolyn Kinney. Workforce Development Division did a presentation on TrainTalk and Training Initiatives. You will see more training on the FJTN and at more convenient times. Until now most of the programs have been convenient to watch if you are in the Eastern Time zone. The AO has been able to acquire more satellite time and will be running programs until late in the afternoon to accommodate the entire country. Though training is taking on many new faces they assured us that live training will continue. Train Talk is

a new site on the J-Net where online discussions for court personnel take place on topics related to training. There is a specific site for us and it is "Train Talk Judge Sec" and can be found on the J-Net at Training. It's a great place to ask questions and exchange information with other judicial secretaries around the country.

Michael Berney from the Federal Judicial Center, did a hands on demonstration of the Court Operations Exchange website on the DCN. Similar to train talk this is an ongoing exchange of dialogue between court staff, but includes many aspects of operations not just training. This site is very new and they are anxious for people to use it.

The Maintaining Your Competitive Edge workshop from a few years ago is still available and they may be updating the contents. There was a lot of discussion about getting training for those new secretaries just coming into the courts.

Following the above presentations the JSAG met in individual focus groups to develop action items.

Staffing Focus Group:

Trish Kowalski (3rd Circuit), Barbara Smith (8 th Circuit), Marcia Carter (6th Circuit) and Candace Jones (9th Circuit). This focus group is working on a quick reference guide for the new judicial secretary; possible benefits; job continuation placement and staffing innovations.

Communications Focus Group:

Donna Silva (1st Circuit), Shirley Newsome (President FJSA), Faith Lyles (DC Circuit), Liz Daigle (President Elect FMJSA), and Paul Funderburk (President Elect ABJA). This focus group is going to get a mail list together of secretaries to federal judges and find a way to keep it updated and to get information to all of us on a quarterly basis.


Education and Training Focus Group: Agatha Ellis (11th Circuit), Cecilia Rudden (2nd Circuit), Flay Sambrone-Metoyer (5th Circuit), Linda Weaver (4th Circuit) and Cindy Grossman (7th Circuit). This focus group has been working with the AO on a two day Administrative and Operation Workshop. This fiscal year we have had three programs in the 1st, 9th and 11th Circuits. We expect to have five programs in FY 2001, beginning in February. Though not definite the Circuits targeted for FY 2001 are the 4th, 5th, 7th, 8th and 10th. Watch for more informa-tion on this program. This focus group also hopes to work with the AO to develop a CD that would be an introduction to the federal courts for new judicial secretaries.

A Tribute to Karen Spedowski

At the FJSA Business Meeting in Boston, we took a few moments to

pay tribute to a very special member who had passed away. Karen

Spedowski was an active member of the FJSA for a number of years and a


frequent attendee at our Annual Conferences. We will miss Karen and her

enthusiasm and contributions to our organization. But we will not forget her, and I for one, am

proud to have been associated with her. Karen's judge, the Honorable David McKeague, delivered

the following eulogy for her. In reading it, you too will be proud of Karen and of our profession.





It's not a coincidence that April 26th was Secretary's Day - Karen was my secretary and on most any other Secretary's Day we would have been at lunch at the Country Club.

Karen's role in my life went far beyond her title, and in the next few minutes, I hope to be able to put into words what Karen meant to me and the many lawyers whose lives she touched.

I met Karen in April of 1972 when she joined Foster, Lindemer, Swift and Collins. Jim had just joined the Mason Police Department and Karen was fresh from about 10 years working with various lawyers in Big Rapids. I had become an associate with the firm in August of 1971, approximately six months earlier. Karen knew what she was doing I didn't a point she quickly made clear. Neither of us could remember exactly when we were paired together, but it was sometime in 1972 and our futures became inseparably linked for the next 28 years.

Karen played a unique role in my life - one that no one will be able to replace.

I knew awhile ago that I would deliver this eulogy. It was never spoken between us, but it didn't have to be, because we simply knew - for better or worse sometimes - what each other was thinking most of the time. You see, Karen didn't work <u>for</u> me, she worked <u>with</u> me.

Karen's friend Karen Woodruff, who will follow me this morning, will probably tell you more about how Karen planned every aspect of this funeral, including who would speak on her behalf. It is only fitting that our relationship comes to an end on this earth with me following one last direction from Karen.

Three words come to mind in describing Karen's professional life: Loyalty, Dedication, and Determination - traits that she employed in everything she did.

When we started out together, Karen was determined to make me the best lawyer in the firm and to make herself the best secretary in the firm. It wasn't enough for Karen to be simply a legal secretary, she decided almost immediately she was going to become certified by the National Association of Legal Secretaries as a Professional Legal Secretary which she accomplished in 1978. The maddest I ever made Karen (among a long list) was when we remodeled our offices a couple of years ago and she felt I didn't rehang this PLS Certificate in a prominent enough spot next to her desk.

Once she became interested in the Lansing Legal Secretaries Association, she was determined to rise to the top among professional legal secretaries, which she did when she became President in 1980 and then Legal Secretary of the Year in 1984.

Karen drifted away from the group after we joined the Court in 1992. Every year we would be invited to the Annual Dinner, and she would decline, until this past February when she told me she wanted to go, which we did. I believe she knew in her heart that it was the last dinner we would attend together.

In 1992, Karen accepted my offer to come with me to the United States District Court. This time neither of us knew what we were doing. Karen again threw all her efforts into her new role, and, of course, there was a new association to conquer - the Federal Judicial Secretaries Association. Until her time was cut short, she had already started to move her way up through that organization too. along the journey, Karen deeply impacted my life, as well as countless lawyers, law clerks, and members of my family. If you were a new associate or law clerk and assigned to Karen, you simply did things Karen's way - the right way - or they didn't get done.

When I called my eldest daughter to tell her of Karen's death, she commented that Karen always knew the good news and the bad news in my children's lives before I did, because when they called they simply weren't going to be able to talk to me until they brought Karen up to date.

As for me, I owe Karen a profound debt of gratitude, because without her loyalty to me personally, her dedication to making me the best possible lawyer and then Judge, and her determination to be the best assistant, I could not have accomplished what I have. Becoming a federal judge is the highest honor a lawyer can achieve - the proudest people at my investiture were my mother, my wife, my children, and Karen.

Karen's giving personality is reflected in this quote from Galations 6:9-10:

"And never let us slacken in doing good; for if we do not give up, we shall have our harvest in due time. So then as long as we have the opportunity, let all our actions be for the good of everybody."

As those of you who knew and loved Karen realize, Karen displayed this same loyalty dedication and determination with Jim, Denise and Paul, her grandchildren of whom she was immensely proud, and te other groups with which she was involved.

I don't generally listen to Paul Harvey, so I don't think it was a coincidence that I heard his news report on April 24, 1999, which was also Secretary's Day. This was his report called "Take a Letter:"

"The best way to get a job done, they say is to give it to a busy man.

He'll have his secretary do it.

I don't know who said that, but she was right.

A good secretary is a gentle diplomat...a professional forger.

But she works for a living.

A good secretary arrives on the minute and departs on the hour.

She plans each new day at the end of the old one...but not out loud.

She corrects his mistakes without reminding him of them.

Shows up when she feels like staying home,

Smiles when she feels like screaming.

She doesn't crab, gripe, or gossip about it.

I thought maybe these are some of the things that you would like to tell your secretary...if you had the nerve..and the words.

A good secretary is something pretty wonderful.

One day when history erects an appropriate monument to the "Information Age"... It sure better be she - the diligent lady with her eyes on the computer and her ear to a telephone holding our world from falling apart."

My life was enriched by the 28 years I was privileged to spend with Karen. I'll miss her very much.



WordPerfect 8/9 Macro Basics

On February 28 and 29, 2000 I sat in on the two-day, two hour broadcast on WordPerfect 8/9 Macro Basics which was moderated by Karen Scales from Technology Training and Support in San Antonio. As usual, Karen did a wonderful job!

This particular course required "push-to-talk" and prior registration. Even though our court does not have "push-to-talk," we did have computers set up for the broadcast and were able to follow along. At the beginning of the broadcast Karen gave a fax number for those watching who did not have "push-to-talk" in the event they had questions for her during the broadcast.

The course gave a basic understanding of how to record, play and edit macros. Karen cleverly devised some "games" in which viewers with "push-to-talk" were able to participate.

Each viewer had been furnished, via Internet, a workbook for the course. Each registered viewer, supposedly, had a computer terminal set up and each terminal had been furnished with the documents needed for the course.

HOW SHALL WE BE CALLED?

Have you made a request to the Administrative Office for a change of title? Various members of the Legislative/Communications Committee have reported what has been done in their Circuits and Districts. There does not seem to be uniformity in the matter, and secretaries who have received approval for title change made individual requests to the Administrative Office, with the approval of their judges.

In the First Circuit, no official action has been taken by the secretaries, either at the Circuit or district level. However, in the District of Rhode Island, which only has three judges and two senior judges, committee member Gail Rice received approval from Judge Torres to change her title from secretary to executive assistant. One of the magistrate judges in Rhode Island has approved a title change for his secretary to judicial assistant. The other secretaries will keep the title of secretary.

Secretaries in the Eastern District of Texas, Fifth Circuit, met last summer and agreed on a change of title to Chambers Administrator. However, some judges in the district opposed such change, holding that secretary is an ancient and honorable profession. As a result, several secretaries in the district chose to keep the title secretary.

In the Western District of Washington, Tacoma Division, Ninth Circuit, the secretaries agreed the title Judicial Assistant seems to be acceptable, although little action has actually been taken to obtain AO approval.

The Eleventh Circuit reports that all of the Circuit secretaries except one have received a title change. However, secretaries in some districts within that Circuit voted on a specific title change, but it was left to each individual judge and secretary to request the change for his secretary.

The Administrative Office has approved a number of title changes for judicial secretaries. To date, the most popular title change has been to Judicial Assistant. The AO also received requests from secretaries to change titles to: Manager, Chambers Operations; Administrative Assistant; Executive Secretary; Paralegal; Administrative Judicial Assistant. Another title some secretaries considered requesting is Chambers Administrator.

At this time, a change of title remains an individual decision by the judges and their secretaries. However, if you and your judge agree on a change of title, such change is not automatic. You should take the initiative. Committee member Sharon Hibbs advises secretaries to request Form AO193 from your court's personnel office, or from the Administrative Office, and complete the request for title change, ask your judge to sign the form, and return it to your personnel office to forward to the appropriate department at the Administrative Office.

REPORT ON MEMBERSHIP

Shirley J. Newsome, Membership Chairman

The Membership Committee presented to the Executive Committee for approval a report on proposed by-law changes for FJSA Membership. The Committee was charged with developing new membership categories that would allow for increased membership in FJSA. Additionally, suggested changes provide for a dues reduction for retired members which would be offset by new Secondary Members. The proposed category changes were presented to the membership at the Annual Conference in Reno. They will be submitted to the membership as a By-Law change for vote by our By-Laws Committee Chairman Judy Anderson.

I have provided an explanation for the proposed revisions in brackets for each category. ARTICLE III: Membership

Membership classifications of the Federal Judicial Secretaries Association shall be: Individual, Sustaining/Transitional, Secondary, and Honorary.

Section 1. **Individual (Active) Members** shall be those secretaries holding appointments by Justices of the Supreme Court of the United States, or by Article III Judges. They shall have the privilege of voting and holding elective office.

[Secretaries to active and senior Appellate and District Court Judges.]

Section 2. Sustaining/Transitional Members are Individual Members in good standing who are no longer employed by a member of the judiciary (Judge) through no fault of the member. This category includes retired secretaries. They may not vote or hold elective office. If reinstated as a judicial secretary, the Sustaining/Transitional Member may resume Individual Member status.

[Judicial secretary whose Judge dies or leaves the judiciary, and is unsuccessful in immediately being rehired by another Judge, but may or may not continue working within the Court System, or other legal entity, and later returns to the Courts.]

Section 3. Secondary Members are those judicial secretaries to members of the judiciary other than Supreme Court Justices, and Article III Appellate or District Court Judges. Secondary Members may, upon application, transfer their membership to Individual Member status and assume all privileges of the same when circumstances dictate.

[Secretaries to Magistrate, Bankruptcy, or Federal Administrative Law Judges such as Court of Federal or Veterans Claims, Armed Forces Appeals, International Trade, and Tax Courts.]

Section 4. **Honorary Members** are individuals selected by the Board/Membership at such time as deemed advisable as a result of outstanding assistance or special service to the Association. An Honorary Member shall have none of the obligations of membership, but shall be entitled to all of the privileges except those of voting and holding elective office.

[This category can include Judges, Court Administrators, Attorneys, Administrative Office staff, Laymen, etc.]

Lastly, the Application for Membership form will be revised to incorporate the foregoing revisions. It has also been suggested that E-Mail addresses be added to the application.

Special thanks to Membership Committee members Margaret M. Murphy, Beth Cummings and Brenda Smith, and to those Circuit Reps who offered comments on the draft proposal.





FJSA member Lynn Stone (Judge Stephen N. Limbaugh, Eastern District of Missouri) advises that the St. Louis secretaries made the move into the Thomas F. Eagleton United States Courthouse during the week of January 22, 2001. While the building is new and is state-of-the-art in most areas, it is currently the largest federal courthouse in the United States and they find themselves somewhat isolated from each other. They hope to plan monthly luncheons or other gatherings as a way to stay in touch.

Every Tuesday this past school year at 11:10 a.m., a yellow school bus pulled up to the St. Paul Federal Courthouse to pick up 23 federal volunteers bound for Benjamin E. Mays Elementary School. The bus made additional stops to pick up volunteers from the Minnesota Attorney General's Office. The Federal and State courts have a collaboration of 132 judges, law clerks, library staff, attorneys, and support staff volunteering as reading buddies, all eager to spend the lunch hour reading one-on-one with one of 92 second-graders. The purpose of the Power Lunch-Everybody Wins program is to encourage students to read for pleasure and, in the process, positive relationships between the adults and children are formed. "Everybody wins when adults read with children" is the motto for the program.

FJSA member Rebecca Baertsch (Judge Donovan W. Frank, District of Minnesota) has been the Federal Court's Volunteer Coordinator for this program for the past two years and an active reading buddy since the program's inception in 1996. Becky reports that last school year there were 11 volunteers reading from the Federal Courts and this year their number has more than doubled. Becky also says that when you arrive at the school and are greeted with a giant hug and a

broad smile from your reading buddy, you will most definitely agree-EVERYBODY WINS! KUDOS to you Becky!

On Thursday, May 10, 2001, secretaries from the District of Kansas (Kansas City, Kansas - 10th Circuit) hosted a luncheon for secretaries from the Western District of Missouri (Kansas City, Missouri - 8th Circuit) at the Robert J. Dole United States Courthouse. Even though we are in two different circuits, our courthouses are only minutes apart. We enjoyed seeing our old friends, renewing past acquaintances and making new ones not to mention the delightful lunch that was served. A reciprocal lunch is currently being planned by the ladies in the 8th Circuit to say "thank you." Who knows, maybe a new tradition is being started.

Bettye McKee, FJSA member and secretary to Judge Robert T. Dawson, U.S. District Court, Western District of Arkansas, shares a part of their Court's history with us:

We are based in Fort Smith, Arkansas, which is right on the border, separated from Oklahoma only by the Arkansas River. Fort Smith's first federal judge was Judge Isaac C. Parker, the Hanging Judge, and the Fort Smith National Historic Site was the site of his first courtroom in one of the barracks of the old fort. A replica of the gallows stands outside. Judge Parker's Courtroom has been restored as nearly as possible to its original condition, down to the pattern of the carpet. Last summer, Judge Dawson tried a civil case in Judge Parker's Courtroom and plans are being made to try another one there this year.

The Western District of Arkansas's first federal judge was Isaac Charles Parker, who came here from Missouri following the Civil War in the mid-1870's, and he served as federal judge from May 10, 1875, until shortly before his death in 1896. Judge Parker is probably one of the most publicized early judges in the nation.

After serving two terms in the U.S.

House of Representatives, Parker was appointed Chief Justice of Utah Territory by President Ulysses S. Grant. However, Parker wrote the President and asked, instead, to be appointed judge of the U.S. Court for the Western District of Arkansas at Fort Smith.

In Judge Parker's time, the area was overrun with outlaws who murdered, raped, and robbed and then crossed into Indian Territory where there was little, if any, law enforcement. Judge Parker's band of U.S. Marshals undertook the perilous job of tracking these outlaws and bringing them to justice, and many of the Marshals were killed in the process. The names of many famous outlaws can be found in the court records, including those of Cherokee Bill and Belle Starr. Unbeknownst to many, the Allen charge which is given to deadlocked juries even today, was first given by Judge Parker in USA v. Allen.

This is an important part of Fort Smith's history, for the town that was known as "Hell on the Border" was tamed through the untiring efforts of Judge Parker and his band of U.S. Marshals.

Thanks Bettye, you encourage all of us to take the time to learn more about the history of our respective Courts.

Again, thanks to all for your contributions to this article. I would request that anyone with information/news to share please keep me posted between newsletters.

I would also like to ask all of the 8th Circuit FJSA members to share this newsletter with any secretary at your Court that is not a member - it may give them the information and encouragement they need to join. I am hoping to meet many of you at the conference in Chicago. Until then, many wishes for a most enjoyable summer!

For the hearing impaired, there is a state of the art sound system and audio cassette player. For printing evidence, there is a color video printer which prints directly from ELMO or PC. Real-time court reporting is available upon request.

Janet Wright, FJSA member and paralegal to Chief Judge Terry C. Kern, reports the remodeling of the ceremonial courtroom for the Northern District of Oklahoma has been completed. These modifications, which took approximately 10 months, included a new judges' bench, which can seat 5 judges, a new clerk's bench,

incorporating a keyhole station for the court reporter and equipment, together with jury and witness boxes that are ADA compliant. Flat screen monitors are provided for the bench, jury, witness and attorney tables along with a video evidence presenter system (VEPS). This courtroom was built in the 60s and these updates are a welcome addition.

In the Northern District of Oklahoma (NDOK), a special ceremony was held November 4, 2000, for Circuit Judge Stephanie K. Seymour in recognition of her service as Chief Judge of the Tenth Circuit. Judges' Secretaries

Advisory Group

"Mission Statement:

To provide advice, assistance, and recommendations to the Administrative Office regarding matter affecting judges' secretaries."

After seven years it seems that there are still some individuals who are not familiar with the JSAG and how it works so I thought before I report on our latest meeting that some background on the JSAG might be helpful.

The JSAG was formed in January 1993 and consists of twelve members, including one judicial assistant/ secretary from each circuit, including the Federal and D.C. consolidated circuits. Appointments to the JSAG are made for two years with the possibility of reappointment. presidents of each of the three associations. Federal Judges' Secretaries Association, Association of Bankruptcy Judges' Assistants, and the Federal Magistrate Judges' Secretaries Association, attend the meetings as observers. Ms. R. Townsend Robinson, Deputy Assistant Director, Office of Human Resources and Statistics is the chair of the JSAG. As Advisory Group to the Administrative Office the JSAG meets annually in Washington D.C. JSAG conducts business throughout the year by teleconferences, facsimile transmissions, and e-mail. We hope in the future to meet by way of vidoeconference. The JSAG also has three individual focus groups: Education & Training, Staffing, and Communications.

April, 2001 was the most recent JSAG meeting and the Administrative Office's official minutes of that meeting can be found on the FJSA website at:

http://www.mad.circ1.dcn/FJSAhome /FJSAhome.htm. If you have a problem getting to it just e-mail our great web master, Martine Talbot (you probably know her better as Martee!), and she'll get you there.

Now, a few highlights of the meeting:

A.C. Ressler, Assistant Mr. Director, Office of Human Resources and Statistics, opened the meeting with welcoming remarks and an overview of all the benefits that we should be taking advantage of. The judiciary is in the forefront of benefits available to its employees. If you were to take advantage of all the benefits that have become available over the last few years using pre-tax dollars your net pay could increase between \$2,500 to \$3,000. The FJTN has many programs on our additional benefits - check them out. If you work for a chief judge he mentioned a new publication coming out in a few months on the chief judge's role and their relationships to other judges and court staff.

Charlotte G. Peddicord, Chief, Human Resources Division, Office of Human Resources and Statistics, spoke on Judicial Resources issues. In March, 2001 the JRC made a recommendation to the Judicial Conference that reasonable accommodations for employees with disabilities be adopted. The AO is studying the types of reasonable accommodations and guidelines that have been developed by other agencies and the private sector in order to formulate guidelines for the judiciary.

Lee D. Horvath, Chief, Judiciary Benefits Program Office and Stan Riggenbach, Policy Analyst, Judiciary Benefits Program Office, presented updates on the flexible benefits programs. If you are enrolled in the Long Term Care program or are considering enrolling you should know that OPM will be implementing a long term care program in 2002 and the AO will be preparing a detailed comparison of both programs so that

you can make an informed decision.

Dan Patton, Computer Security Specialist, Information Technology Security Office, stressed to us the importance of computer security issues in chambers. One way to limit risks is to limit access to your computer. By taking measures to keep your computer secure you are also securing all the computers in your network. He asked us to make sure that we are all aware of our court's security policies and to support them.

Steve Levinson, Special Assistant, Office of Information Technology, Cynthia Alston, Program Analyst, Office of Information Technology and Roger Wilson, Lotus Notes Professional Services, provided a demonstration of the new Lotus Notes email that is coming soon. Some of the key benefits to this new system is that it is easier to have remote access, it can be integrated into your calendar and that there will be a national It works and looks very directory. similar to cc:mail and while there may be a few days of confusion while it is being installed it shouldn't take to much of an adjustment moving from cc:mail to Lotus.

Maurice White, Chief Program and Workforce Development and Terri Tinsley, Branch Chief of the Workforce Development Branch of the Program and Workforce Development Division. Mr. White encouraged us to take advantage of all the programs that are on the FJTN. If you are not receiving a copy of the FJTN Bulletin it can be found on the J-Net Training site along with other information on We are very training programs. fortunate that Mr. White and his staff are very interested in training issues for judicial assistants/secretaries. With assistance of the Education and Training Focus Group of the JSAG (JSAGET's)they have presented five workshops for us that have been Circuit-wide. It is an Administrative and Operational Training Workshop. This summer will bring the program to the 4, 7, 8, and 10 Circuits.

The second project that they are developing with the assistance of the JSAGET's is a CD-ROM that is a concise informational CD for both experienced and newly appointed judicial assistants/secretaries, that provides a quick resourceful overview of tasks within chambers. It will include easy to use menus, forms and links to frequently used sites. It is expected to be released in early fall.

Please, if there is anything that you think should be included in this program email Cindy Grossman and give her your suggestions - we don't want to miss anything.

Michele Reed, Attorney Advisor, Article III Judges Division discussed the Federal Law Clerk Information System. This program that is available to search for judicial clerkships has been receiving 36,000 hits per month. So if you haven't put hiring information in yet for the judge please consider doing so because the students are using it. If you have any problems with it contact Ms. Reed at 202-502-1864.

What is Lotus Notes/Domino?

Beginning earlier this year, the judiciary began migrating to a new nationally-supported email system, Lotus Notes/Domino, which will replace the aging cc:Mail system used by the judiciary for nearly a decade. The motivation behind replacing cc:Mail has to do with the fact that after October 31 of this year, the cc:Mail vendor will no longer provide support or updates for the cc:Mail

product. The judiciary must move on and has chosen Lotus Notes/Domino as the next generation messaging system for the judiciary.

"Notes" refers to the "client" or end-user side of the system. It offers comprehensive email with integrated calendaring, scheduling, and support for Internet mail standards and "Domino" refers to the protocols. "server" or invisible-to-the user side of the system. It is a computing platform capable of integrated messaging and rapid groupware applicationdevelopment. In addition, Domino servers are "web-enabled" which means that they can serve both Notes clients and internet browser clients. The Domino server is scalable to grow

over time - from tens to hundreds to thousands of users on a single server.

The Notes/Domino product is widely acknowledged as the market-leading client server e-mail and groupware product, with a world-wide user base of over 30 million and constantly growing, in both the commercial and government environments. Notes/Domino has been available since 1989, and is now at major release level 5. As a result, it is a stable and mature product, with many add-ons. It also protects the judiciary's investment in earlier systems by allowing for integration with those systems. For example, there are developed and proven tools available to assist in converting other mail

systems, such as cc:Mail, Microsoft Exchange, Groupwise Mail into Lotus Notes/Domino. These tools will be used extensively during the Judiciary conversion process.

Notes/Domino is used by many of the world's leading companies to deliver secure email communication, collaboration and business applications. It has been deployed in 42 of the Fortune 50 companies, and 78 of the Fortune 100. These large companies, and much smaller organizations, that have deployed Notes/Domino have typically seen high returns for their investment, averaging almost double (i.e. 186%), return for the investment, with an average payback period of 2.5 years.

In addition to all of the features that cc:Mail users have become comfortable with through the years, Notes will be a much more comprehensive and powerful product. New to cc:Mail users will be the calendaring, and scheduling features as well as seamless integration with internet mail. Notes users can also manage their workflow with a variety or task assignment features. Task owners can reschedule or cancel tasks, and task assignees can accept delegate, or request modifications to the tasks.

Notes, compared to cc:Mail, reduces cc:Mail's "hover" factor, requiring that cc:Mail be up and running to get the benefits of the Notes has an extensive product. message checking capability which occurs even when the user's computer is turned off because the activity is taking place on the server. Notes can watch for messages from a certain sender or messages that contain a certain subject and then select what to do when those messages arrive. When a user's computer is turned on, Notes does not have to be running for a user to get a notice that a new message has come in.

Notes supports signatures files, giving a simple way to further identify the user and add pertinent information to every email message.

For the increasingly important world of mobile and remote computing, Notes allows users to fully participate in the business process, whether or not they are connected to the network. Notes can be used when disconnected to the network to read and prepare mail and to schedule meetings. Then, when communication is required, the mobile user can very easily connect using either dial up software or Notes. When the need arises to take the calendar on the road, Notes gives multiple print formats to choose from.

Of particular interest to court technical staff and systems managers is the scalable Domino server which accommodates thousands of users, over a million hits per day and a 99 gigabyte mail storage capacity per server. The Domino server supports the different internet mail standards and protocols such as IMAP, POP3 and SMTP in addition to allowing access to mail from a browser or over the Internet. Other features include directory synchronization with other mail systems and Message Transfer Agents (MTAs) to provide message conversion and routing between different mail systems. Domino supports the Lightweight Directory Access Protocol (LDAP) addressing external users in third part web-based directories.

To ease the transition to the new system, the AO's e-mail project team has developed an internal web site for systems managers, court unit managers and interested end-users. The site plays a key role in communicating the progress of the migration. The site features include project updates, product features, readiness kit, technical information, training and support, answers to frequently asked questions, a discussion forum and document libraries. 

A Friend Remembered ...

Madeline Kelly, Secretary to Judge Arthur D. Spatt, recently gave me this article with a very appropriately worded cover memorandum, stating the following: "Attached is a copy of a Letter to the Editor that appeared in today's New York Law Journal. What a magnificent tribute to Linda and, by reflection to our profession. I thought all of you would enjoy reading this moving eulogy—it is so seldom that the secretary receives public accolades.



The Eastern District of New York lost one of its stars last week. She was not a brilliant judge handling down learned opinions. She was not a bold prosecutor seeking justice, nor a daring defense attorney seeking vindication for the wrongly accused. She was not a partner in a powerful firm. She was

LINDA MAZZELLA, a secretary to a magistrate judge, and a fixture in the Brooklyn Federal Courthouse.

Linda served as secretary to the Magistrate Judge A. Simon Chrein, for the last 25 years. Prior to that she worked as a secretary for the United States Attorney's Office. It was there that a younger Chrein, a federal defender at the time, discovered that Linda had a particular gift for removing him from the offices of his adversary smoothly and with aplomb. So impressed was Mr. Chrein with Linda's abilities that when he became Commissioner Chrein (the title of the position has since changed to Magistrate and later Magistrate Judge), he asked Linda to work with him. She joined his chambers and assumed the position of secretary.

Over the last 25 years, Linda served admirably. She prepared orders, filed reports and recommendations, arranged conferences, schedule hearing, trained law clerks, greeted attorneys, maintained a docket system, trained other secretaries and performed a multitude of other too numerous to mention or imagine. She handled all of these tasks without complaint. She loved her job and the people with whom she worked. She was forever loyal to "the Chief" as she called Magistrate Judge Chrein (even after Magistrate Judge Azrack assumed the title of Chief Magistrate Judge). She was devoted to her friends, to her job, and to the people of the Eastern District. It is likely that during her tenure, she greeted more attorneys appearing in the Brooklyn Federal Court than any other person. She was for many, including me, the face of the Eastern District.

Born and raised in Cobble Hill and Carroll Gardens, Linda knew all of the Brooklyn Neighborhood hot spots. She could quote "Moonstruck." She took friends out for lunch in Red Hook for panelles and along Court Street for garlic pizza (reserved for special days where there was no afternoon calendar). She loved Elvis – even owned one of his outfits. She was a character. She laughed easily with law clerks (like me), janitors, judges, marshals, court reports and attorneys.

Last week she died of cancer. Few knew what she was going through these past few months. She handled her burden as she handled her life, with dignity and class. The funeral took place in Cobble Hill. Among those attending were numerous Eastern District judges, former law clerks, Clerk's Office personnel, Assistant U.S. Attorneys, defense counsel and of courts, Linda's family and friends. At the end of the funeral Mass, at her sister's suggestion, the congregation rose and gave Linda a heartfelt standing ovation. As the funeral procession left the Cobble Hill church where Linda attended Mass every week, it headed up Court Street and along Cadman Plaza for one last look at her courthouse.

The Eastern District has lost one of its stars, and I one of my friends.

What To Do If You Lose Your Purse or Wallet

Thank you **Betty Wilson (Judge Michael Kanne, 7th Circuit)** for passing on the very helpful information she received from a friend.



We've all heard horror stories about fraud that's committed using your name, address, SS#, credit, etc. Unfortunately I (author of this piece) have firsthand knowledge, because my wallet was stolen last month and within a week the thieve(s) ordered an expensive monthly cell phone package, applied for a VISA credit card, had a credit line approved to buy a Gateway

computer, received a PIN number from DMV to change my driving record information online, and more. But here's some critical information to limit the damage in case this happens to you or someone you know.

As everyone always advises, cancel your credit cards immediately, but the key is having the toll free numbers and your card numbers handy so you know who to call. Keep those where you can find them easily (having to hunt for them is additional stress you WON'T need at that point!). On a personal note, I remember losing a MC and until I got the toll free number from information, etc. I was a wreck.

File a police report immediately in the jurisdiction where it was stolen, this proves to credit providers you were diligent, and is a first step toward an investigation (if there ever is one).

But here's what is perhaps most important: I never ever thought to do this. Call the three nations credit reporting organizations immediately to place a fraud alert on your name and SS#. I had never heard of doing that until advised by a bank that called to tell me an application for credit was made over the Internet in my name. The alert means any company that checks your credit knows your information was stolen and the have to contact you by phone to authorize new credit.

By the time I was advised to do this - almost 2 weeks after the theft all the damage had been done (there are records of all the credit checks initiated by the thieves' purchases,

none of which I knew about before placing the alert). Since then, no additional damage has been done, and the thieves threw my wallet away this weekend (someone turned it in). It seems to have stopped them in their tracks. The numbers are: Equifax 1-800 535-6285, Experian (Formerly TRW) 1-800 301-7195, Trans Union 1-800 680-7289. The Social Security Administration also has a fraud line at 1-800 269-0271. Think about passing this information along....it could help someone else.

Keep safe while out in large crowds, shopping, eating out and vacationing always remember to be aware of your surroundings.



Do You Know Your U.S. Currency?

Take out a one dollar bill and look at it. The one dollar bill you're looking at first came off the presses in 1957 in its present design. This so-called paper money is in fact a cotton and linen blend, with red and blue minute silk fibers running through it. It is actually material. We've all washed it without it falling apart. A special blend of ink is used, the contents we will never know. It is overprinted with symbols and then it is starched to make it water resistant and pressed to give it that nice crisp look. If you look on the front of the bill, you will see the United States Treasury Seal. On the top you will see the scales for the balance a balanced budget.

In the center you have a carpenter's T-square, a tool used for an even cut. Underneath is the Key to the United States Treasury. That's all pretty easy to figure out, but what is on the back of



that dollar bill is something we should all know.

If you turn the bill over, you will see two circles. Both circles, together, comprise the Great Seal of the United States. The First Continental Congress requested that Benjamin Franklin and a group of men come up with a Seal. It took them four years to accomplish this task and another two years to get it approved.

If you look at the left hand circle, you will see a Pyramid. Notice the face is lighted and the western side is dark. This country was just beginning. We had not begun to explore the West

or decided what we could do for Western Civilization. The Pyramid is un-capped, again signifying that we were not even close to being finished. Inside the capstone you have the all-seeing eye, and ancient symbol for divinity. It was Franklin's belief that one man couldn't do it alone, but a group of men, with the help of God, could do anything.

"IN GOD WE TRUST" is on this currency. The Latin above the pyramid, ANNUIT COEPTIS, means "God has favored our undertaking." The Latin below pyramid, NOVUS ORDO SECLORUM, means "a new order has begun." At the base of the pyramid is the Roman Numeral for 1776.

If you look at the right-hand circle, and check it carefully, you will learn that it is on every National Cemetery in the United States. It is also on the Parade of Flags Walkway at the Bushnell, Florida National Cemetery and is the centerpiece of most hero's monuments. Slightly modified, it is -cont'd. on page 28

the seal of the President of the United States and it is always visible whenever he speaks, yet no one knows what the symbols mean.

The Bald Eagle was selected as a symbol for victory for two reasons: first, he is not afraid of a storm; he is strong and he is smart enough to soar above it. Secondly, he wears no material crown. We had just broken from the King of England. Also, notice the shield is unsupported. This country can now stand on its own. At the top of that shield you have a white bar signifying congress, a unifying factor. We were coming together as one nation. In the Eagle's beak you will read, "E PLURIBUS UNUM", meaning "one nation from many people."

Above the Eagle you have thirteen stars representing the thirteen original colonies, and any clouds of misunderstanding rolling away. Again, we were coming together as one. Notice what the Eagle holds in

his talons. He holds an olive branch and arrows. This country wants peace, but we will never be afraid to fight to preserve peace. The Eagle always wants to face the olive branch, but in time of war, his gaze turns toward the arrows.

They say that the number 13 is an unlucky number. This is almost a worldwide belief. You will usually never see a room numbered 13, or any hotels or motels with a 13th floor. But, think about this: 13 original colonies, 13 signers of the Declaration of Independence, 13 stripes on our flag, 13 steps on the Pyramid, 13 letters in the Latin above, 13 letters in "E Pluribus Unum", 13 stars above the Eagle, 13 plumes of feathers on each span of the Eagle's wing, 13 bars on that shield, 13 leaves on the olive branch, 13 fruits, and if you look closely, 13 arrows. And for minorities: the 13th Amendment.

"Why don't you know this?" Your children don't know this and their history teachers don't know this.

Too may veterans have given up too much to ever let the meaning fade. Many veterans remember coming home to an America that didn't care. Too many veterans never came home at all. Tell everyone what is on the back of the one dollar bill and what it stands for, because nobody else will.
